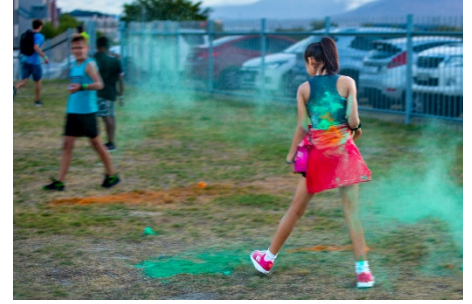

Principal's message:

As we reach the end of the term, I want to remind parents and learners not to wind down too soon. The test series is starting shortly, and you need to have all your ducks in a row. The teachers are here to support and guide learners to reach their academic goals set for Term 1.

Parents, do you ever think of tough love and what it means? Do you even believe in it? Do you think it is necessary? Do you think there must be consequences for your child's actions?

As a child, my parents never sugar-coated anything; if I was wrong, I was wrong, and I had to take responsibility for my actions. That made me more determined to achieve the goals I have set for myself. But when is it too tough? When does it become parent bullying?

The discussion over how tough to be on learners seems to be a double-edged sword. On the one hand, honest parenting can help children set realistic goals, but it can sometimes hurt their self-worth and self-esteem. On the other hand, the "A for effort" method makes learners feel better about themselves, but at the cost of self-delusion. The debate is a fairly new one, with limited research supporting either side.

The study found that how children are raised has a big effect on their social skills as adults. Parents who used "tough love" were twice as likely to raise children who were empathetic, strong-willed, and able to control their emotions. Opponents of tough love parenting call it "bullying parenting." Studies have shown that children who grow up in households with an authoritarian parenting style often struggle with self-esteem and aggression and are less mature than their peers. However, there is a fine line between tough love and bullying parenting.

In the end, you as a parent need to decide what works for you, but tough love tends to show children how to improve their self-esteem while also teaching them to respect authority and the rules. They learn how to control their wants and needs, understand that they must treat others more respectfully, and accept that they won't always get what they want.
